Candidate Biographies

Chair-Elect

Timothy J. Ives, Pharm.D., M.P.H., is Associate Professor of Pharmacy and Medicine, at the Eshelman School of Pharmacy, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (UNC-CH). He received his baccalaureate and doctoral degrees in pharmacy at the University of Florida, a Master of Public Health in Health Policy and Administration, and a fellowship at UNC-CH. Prior to coming to UNC-CH, he was a member of the faculties of the University of Utah and the Medical University of South Carolina. Dr. Ives is a licensed pharmacist and clinical pharmacist practitioner (CPP) in North Carolina, and is Board Certified in Pharmacotherapeutics by the Board of Pharmaceutical Specialties. He is a Fellow of the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists (ASHP), as well as the American College of Clinical Pharmacy (ACCP), and has served as its Secretary.

At UNC-CH, Dr. Ives has served as interim Chair of the Division of Pharmacy Practice, Chair of the Orange County Board of Health, and is the current Director of the Chronic Pain Program, Division of General Medicine and Clinical Epidemiology, School of Medicine. His research interests are in the area of inflammation and chronic pain management, with neuropathic pain in particular.

Within the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy (AACP), Dr. Ives has served as Chair of the Bylaws and Policy Development Committee, and is the current Secretary of the Section of Teachers of Pharmacy Practice. Within the Section, he has served on the Program and Nominations Committees, Task Force on Teaching Excellence, and has chaired the Membership and Resolutions Committee, Communications Task Force, and Strategic Planning and Bylaws Task Force.

June Felice Johnson, B.S., Pharm.D., FASHP, CDM-Diabetes is Associate Professor of Pharmacy Practice at Drake University College of Pharmacy & Health Sciences. She holds an adjunct appointment as a Clinical Assistant Professor, Physiology and Pharmacology, at Des Moines University College of Osteopathic Medicine. Prior to her position at Drake, she held adjunct or regular faculty positions at the University of Buffalo, Albany College of Pharmacy, the University of Minnesota, and Wayne State University.

June received her BS in pharmacy from the University of Buffalo, completed an ASHP accredited residency in hospital pharmacy at the University of Nebraska Hospital and Clinics, completed a

graduate gerontology certificate at the University of Utah, and received her post-graduate Doctor of Pharmacy degree from the University of Utah. She is a licensed pharmacist, Fellow in the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists, and nationally credentialed as a Certified Disease Manager in Diabetes.

At Drake University, Dr. Johnson has served as the Vice Chair for the Pharmacy Practice Department, and currently serves as Director of Faculty and Site Development. She is a research coordinator at the Iowa Diabetes & Endocrinology Research Center where she participates in sponsored and investigator-initiated clinical trials in diabetes and precepts pharmacy students. She is a medical staff volunteer for Camp Hertko Hollow, a diabetes camp for youth in Iowa, and is a member of their Board of Directors.

Her involvement at AACP includes: Member of a subcommittee on Measuring Student Performance and member of a task force on Faculty Work Force for the Section of Teachers of Pharmacy Practice, and member of the Advisory Panel on Educational Outcomes for CAPE.
