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Health Care Reform

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) signed by the President in March elevates disease prevention and health promotion to an unprecedented level. The Act authorizes the establishment of a Prevention and Public Health Fund that will make sustained funding available beginning this federal fiscal year (FY10) with \$2 billion available by FY 15 and beyond. The dedicated funding will support “programs authorized by the [Public Health Service Act] PHSA and other prevention and research programs to increase their total funding above that appropriated in FY08.” The text of this ground-breaking provision is available at the following link http://docs.house.gov/rules/hr4872/111_hr3590_engrossed.pdf with the prevention provisions starting in on page 1114. The Fund authorizing language is found in Section 4002 which

starts on page 1121 et seq.

During the SIG’s business meeting at the AACP annual meeting, Will Lang will join us to discuss these important provisions. SIG members are asked to review the authorizing language for the above referenced Fund and be prepared to provide AACP staff with examples of how academic pharmacy is engaged with current health promotion and disease prevention teaching, research and service. The SIG can play an essential role in AACP advocacy efforts to ensure that this dedicated funding stream for current and future programs will allow for pharmacy faculty participation. Prior to the business meeting AACP staff will provide SIG members with additional information regarding this section of PPACA for review and support of the development of an important advocacy network.
