

PHARMACY PRECEPTOR SURVEY SUMMARY REPORT – 2012

The Preceptor Survey was available for online access in the AACP Centralized Survey System on May 7, 2012. As of September 2012, 72 out of 129 (55.8%) colleges and schools of pharmacy administered the survey to their preceptors. Twenty-eight thousand, five hundred and seventy (28,570) preceptors were invited to complete the survey. Seven thousand, nine hundred and ninety-seven (7,997) preceptors submitted the survey for a total response rate of twenty-eight percent (28.0%). Response rates per school ranged from 4.3 percent to 69.7 percent. 






Nearly fifty percent of preceptors (49.7%) that responded have been licensed pharmacists for more than fifteen years.

Number of Years as a Licensed Pharmacist






I Precept Students In




Over forty-nine percent (49.3%) of respondents precept students in both introductory and advanced pharmacy practice experiences.

Number of Years as a Preceptor for this College/School




Number of Schools I Precept For



Number of Students I Directly Precepted




Section II: Communication




Overall, preceptors were satisfied with the level of communication from schools and colleges concerning student feedback, performance, academic and professional misconduct, and harrassment. Nearly eighty-three percent (82.5%) agreed or strongly agreed with the statements in this section.

The statement that received the least positive response concerned receiving the results from student evaluations. Nearly twenty-four percent (23.9%) of preceptors disagreed or strongly disagreed with this statement.






Nearly ninety-one percent (90.9%) of preceptors strongly agreed or agreed with statements in the section regarding curriculum.

Nearly ninety-one percent (90.6%) of respondents were in agreement that the assessment tools provided to them for their site are suitable for measuring student performance.

Section IV: Resources/Support



Nearly eighty-seven percent (86.7%) of preceptors strongly agreed or agreed with the statements concerning the resources and support provided by the Office of Experiential Education, student-to-preceptor ratios, continuing professional development, facilities, and library.

The statement in this section concerning student-to-preceptor ratios had the most positive response. Over ninety-six percent (96.6%) of preceptors agreed or strongly agreed that student-to-preceptor ratios at their site are appropriate to maximize learning.
