

Integrating the Entrustable Professional Activities (EPAs) for pharmacy practice into general experiential learning outcomes

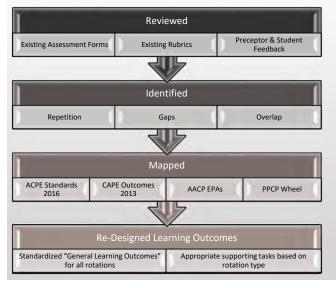


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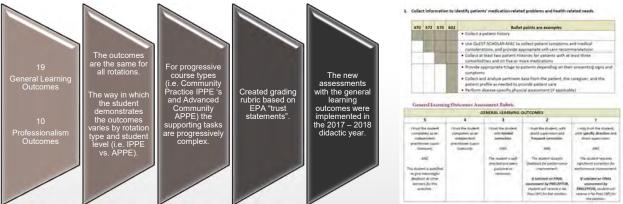
Objectives

- 1. To redesign experiential learning outcomes and integrate ACPE Standards 2016, CAPE Outcomes 2013, PPCP Wheel, and AACP EPAs for New Pharmacy Graduates.
- 2. To provide cohesion and uniformity between rotation types to better allow for longitudinal evaluation of student progress.
- 3. To provide specific practice-based examples of micro-level activities to guide preceptors to better assess student achievement of outcomes.

Implications

General learning outcomes that incorporate EPAs ensure that student learning is focused on the defined skills, abilities, and attitudes that are expected of the student upon graduation.

Providing varying examples of supporting tasks for the EPA-based learning outcomes allows opportunity to differentiate the level (introductory vs. advanced) of student learning on rotations and provides specific examples for students and preceptors to determine what activities meet the learning outcomes in each practice setting.
